**Mentor2Success Outcomes:**

- A woman with a 12 year history of opioid use when her baby was born with opioids in her system. She has now been clean off of heroine for 11 months. She is using minimal amounts of Suboxone to maintain sobriety. She is now sober, has full custody of her children, has a stable home, and her case with DSS has been closed.
- A young woman with an opioid addiction for several years had previously lost custody of 2 children. She gave birth to a baby born positive for opioids. She used methadone to help her taper down off heroine. She has completed Crossroads 60 day program. She is now clean, lives with her mother and 3 children. She has a job. She's now proud of herself for buying things for the baby with her paychecks instead of buying drugs.
- A woman recently lost custody of her child due to a relapse on methamphetamines. Initially, she refused inpatient treatment for fear of being locked up. In working with her M2S recovery coach, she agreed outpatient treatment at Crossroads. After seeing all of the "cool" classes and activities at Crossroads, she agreed to inpatient treatment. She has been in rehab now for 4 weeks. She has volunteered to stay another 30 days to help herself transition back to the community and to find work. Her goal and the court's goal is for her to regain custody of her child within the next 60 days.
